




#### Confirmation Service at St John Lloyd Catholic Church (5)

been an extremely valuable experience for us as a school and has raised the profile of the incredibly hard work staff and students are putting in to make our Welsh Baccalaureate programmes one of the best in Wales.

# THE CARDIFF COMMITMENT


